### Multiple District 22 to Welcome International President Yamada



When the Multiple District 22 Lions, Lioness and Leo's meet in Hagerstown, Maryland May 16 to the 19<sup>th</sup>, they will have the honor of hosting International President Dr. Jitsuhiro Yamada from Japan.

President Yamada will be the key note speaker at the Tuesday night banquet, in addition to participating in the presentation of his awards and inducting new members. During the convention he will attend the Melvin Jones Luncheon, providing an LCIF update and participating in awards to key supporters of LCIF.

Convention attendees will have an opportunity to meet President Yamada during an open discussion session with members of the Lions International Family, especially Club Presidents, Family and Women Members and have a photo taken with him. He will also participate in the Lions Memorial Service being held on Wednesday May 18th.

#### IP Dr. Yamada

Dr. Yamada of Minokamo, Gifu, Japan, was elected to serve as President of Lions Clubs International at the 98th International Convention held in Honolulu, last June.

President Yamada is a neurosurgeon.

A member of the Minokamo Lions Club, President Yamada has been a Lion since 1985. He has held many offices in the association, including District Governor and GLT constitutional area vice leader. He served on the International Board from 2005 to 2007 as a member of the Executive Committee and the Long Range Planning Committee and Vice Chairperson of the Convention Committee. He also served as a board appointee for 2011-12.

In recognition of his service to the association, President Yamada has received numerous awards, including the Humanitarian Partner Award, 10 International Presidents Awards and Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. He is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to his Lions activities, President Yamada is chairperson for several organizations including the Social Medical Corporation Koseikai, the Kizawa Memorial Hospital, the Social Welfare Corporation Jikeikai, Nozominooka Hospital and Ajisai Nursing College. He is standing director of the Japan Hospital Association and an affiliate professor at Gifu University.

President Yamada has been active in the area of international relations, serving as president of the Gifu-Hungary Friendship Association, Gifu Morocco Association and Gifu-Salzburg association. He is recipient of the Order of Merit of the Republic of Hungry, the Medal of Honor of the Alaouite Dynasty of the Kingdom of Morocco and an honorary citizen of Beijing City, China, in recognition of his service to international friendship building.

President Yamada and his wife, Dr. Toshiko Yamada, also a Lion and Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have one son, one daughter and three grandchildren.



ceived an award for the most money raised by a club. CONGRATULATIONS LION SHERRY!!!!


### **Midway Lions**

We are helping Frederica Senior Center collect 'A Mile of Pennies' for their building fund. Anyone have pennies to get rid of? We will take them!



### **Camp Abilities Delaware 2016**

The Division for the Visually Impaired and the Delaware Association of Blind Athletes are sponsoring a summer day camp for Delaware youth with visual impairments. This camp will run for 5 days this summer, 9am-4:15pm, July 25-29, 2016. A one-week program would allow students to refine sport skills, develop relationships with other students with visual impairments, have access to positive role models that encourage independence, and increase understanding of healthy lifestyle.

The Camp Abilities program will be located at Killens Pond State Park in Felton, Kent County, DE. This will allow the maximum number of students to participate from all three counties. Students will be pooled from DVI school-age caseloads (5-21). We have secured transportation for the New Castle County students, via All In One Transportation; for Kent County students, via ParaTransit; and for Sussex County students, via DelMarVa Transportation. Last year, we had 13 students participate in our trial program. We hope to increase that number to 20 this year, and then expand even further in subsequent years. We have 7 students from NCC and KC registered already.

We are requesting involvement of your Lions Club with a financial donation. Lions Clubs are involved in various ways at other Camp Abilities camps. In Tucson, AZ and Brockport, NY, the Lions donate food and cook for us. In West Chester, PA, the Lions Clubs donate money and visit throughout the week. Any sort of assistance in our first year would be greatly appreciated.
