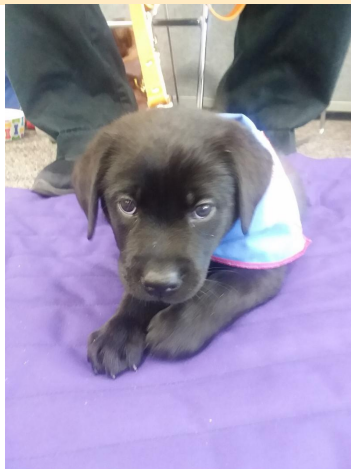

Helping Those With Low Vision

Multi-faceted approach needed for a growing problem

“Low vision (LV) is a general term used to describe permanent disabling visual impairment, mostly caused by age-related eye diseases, such as macular degeneration, glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy,” explains Robert Massof, Ph.D. “Seventy percent of the approximately 5.7 million Americans with low vision are over age 65. And, sadly, only 25 percent of those are eligible for blindness-related benefits. There is a severe shortage of services for those who do not meet the legal criteria for blindness.”

Massof, founder and director of the Lions Low Vision Research and Rehabilitation Center at the Wilmer Eye Institute, part of Johns Hopkins Medicine, speaks passionately about this condition. “If you’re blind, you are eligible for a wide variety of services to help you cope in your daily life. But, often, those with LV are not covered by any programs.”

According to Lions Low Vision Research and Rehabilitation Center’s website, www.lvnet.org, “low vision is a general medical term used to describe impaired vision in both eyes that cannot be corrected to normal with medical treatment, surgery or eyeglasses. The term low vision does not refer to any particular disease, it refers to the visual impairment itself, which can be caused by any of a wide variety of eye, optic nerve and brain disorders.”

Because the primary sufferers of LV are seniors, there is a huge need for rehabilitation services. Children and working-age adults get benefits from state or fed-

eral funds. Most seniors, who depend on Medicare, cannot tap into them. Rehabilitation teaches those who cannot see how to manage tasks that depend on sight. This requires going into homes and modifying the environment to be easier to use. Because there aren’t a lot of programs making this available, the Lions Clubs took this on and developed LOVRNET to address the shortage of service.

It’s not just about LV. Those with LV, with an average age of 77, usually have other age-related issues, such as hearing loss, joint pain, balance issues and depression. The diseases that cause LV are treatable, but not LV itself – it’s not curable and the vision cannot be corrected enough to eliminate vision problems.

Thus, the need exists for a more extensive network of ophthalmologists, optometrists, opticians and occupational therapists to help this segment of the older population manage their lives. They need



transportation, assistance with activities of daily living (ADLs), along with vision rehabilitation therapists (VRTs) to work with and train patients.

With all this information, Lions made addressing the consequences of this illness a priority. The Lions worked with the center at Johns Hopkins to figure out what was required from an infrastructure perspective, who needed to be involved, what laws needed to be changed and how to make this happen. Eventually, these efforts led to Medicare involvement, which gave it a national platform. Then, it took on creating a model program to deal with these problems. It started with chapters in Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia to “address the current shortage and distribution of low vision rehabilitation services and [it] can expand to keep pace with the growth in demand as our population ages,” according to www.lvnet.org.

Where Do You Come In?

Before someone can be assisted, the organization needs a history and questionnaire completed. Volunteers go through

training so they understand the legal issues involved, such as the HIPAA laws, and the best way to handle what is a structured conversation.

You don’t have to be a Lion or even leave home to help. All you need is a computer, telephone and internet connection.

Volunteers can visit prospective recipients to gather information about the home environment. Then occupational therapists can develop a plan to modify the abode for ease of use. They also need people to do community outreach and educate the public on stereotypes associated with blindness and visual impairments.

LOVRNET also needs ophthalmologists and optometrists to evaluate, educate and counsel low vision patients, as well as do difficult refractions and provide assistive technology so vision can be corrected to the highest degree.

Given the number of people already affected by low vision, a number growing quickly as our population ages, there is already a lack of services to address their needs. Visit www.lvnet.org today and sign up to support this worthy program. •

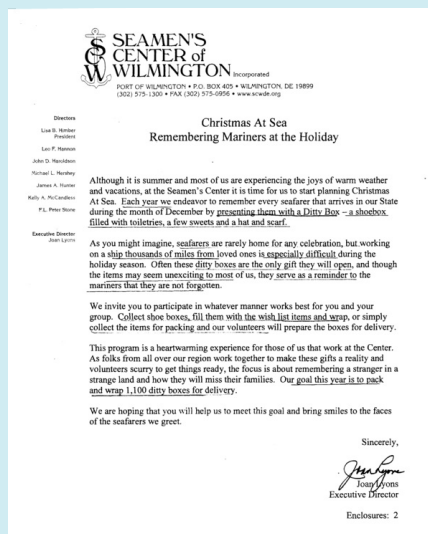

September's Club Meeting Speaker

It is important for every Lion to become familiar with the Lions Club International Constitution, which is the main operating document for all Clubs nationwide. It is equally as important for every Club to review, modify and update their bylaws.

Lee Bird, who is the Constitution and Bylaws Chair for 22D, gave a brief explanation on all the different documents which govern the Lions Club, both locally and internationally. The first was the LCI Constitution which is the main document all clubs must follow. The International Constitution is a fixed document, it governs all Clubs and it gets changed once a year. This is also known as the "supreme" document.

Next, was the Multiple District 22 Constitution which breaks down the policies and procedures within the district. This document covers all Delaware and Maryland Clubs. The LCI Standard Form is used to create specific club documents and governs any disputes not covered in the individual Clubs' Constitution or Bylaws. This form should be reviewed and updated regularly.

Developing clear Bylaws are extremely important in order to avoid misunderstanding within the Club. Lee urged us to make every effort to review and/or updated our Clubs Constitution and Bylaws if it has not been done for several years.

22D Lions Clubs: are you prepared to deal with the hurricane season?

We are moving into the tropical storm and hurricane season. Flooding, high winds, flying debris, and with snow and ice storms this winter can cause power outages and shut down a community. Calls for service can be too much for the local first responders to handle. The Lions ALERT program has been around for years but, for some reason only a couple clubs have taken advantage of the program and made plans to fill the void to address the needs of its members and to the community if needed.

It is really a simple plan and does not require a lot of skills to put together. Someone takes the bull by the horns and looks into the ALERT program. Discuss it with the club and see if they want to create an ALERT plan. Find team leaders in your club that are good problem solvers and have skills in managing people. Do a survey on the needs and skills of the club members and what resources are available such as 4-wheel drive trucks, a tractor or generators and also members with carpentry, plumbing and electrician experience. Encourage members to be ready for an emergency with food and water to last them for several days.

If you like you can ask me to make a presentation or help your club get organized. If you want to see a sample of an ALERT plan I will send you the Lord Baltimore Lions Club plan that was the first approved plan in 22-D in October of 2017. I also have power point presentations available. At a minimum make sure you have a good phone tree for your club and check on your members before the bad weather hits and after it passes to make sure that they are OK. Our motto is we serve. We do but, in an emergency, we should serve our
