

OUR FOUNDATION

My Fellow Lions,

Hurricane Matthew affected several areas, including the Caribbean and the United States. It was the deadliest hurricane in the Atlantic Ocean since 2005. Many main roads are impassible and many bridges have been washed away. Food and drinking water are in short supply and many of those who need aid the most are still waiting for it to arrive. When disaster strikes, Lions are among the first to offer help to the victims, even though they are often victims themselves. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is right there beside them, ready to support their efforts with funding assistance through Lions disaster relief programs. Working together, LCIF, local Lions and Lions leaders assess the urgent needs and quickly deliver the aid most required by victims.

LCIF awarded an initial Emergency grant to Haiti to address immediate needs of disaster victims. Lions and Leos from Port-au-Prince traveled to Petit-Goâve to work with clubs there. Together, they have packed and distributed over 2,000 relief kits of medicine and food to residents in need.

LCIF has also awarded an Emergency grant to the Lions of 31-N in North Carolina, USA. Lions there are braving the conditions to bring much needed food, water, blankets and medical supplies to those affected most by the storm. More updates about the relief work there is forthcoming.

The situation is dire, but Lions are working to bring hope to their neighbors. You can show your support for Lions and their work by making a donation to LCIF's disaster relief fund today.







Our Oct 1st Spaghetti Dinner held at Warren Station Restaurant had




preliminary sales of 384 meals and about \$4500 taken in at the door. Thanks to all the Lions and Leos who helped with this great fundraiser.

Lions ALERT Program

Lions are continually involved in disaster relief around the world. The Lions ALERT program strives to provide specific direction to the 46,000 Lions clubs and help them to be more efficient in providing short and long term support to disaster victims.

The objective of the Lions ALERT Program is to develop a plan of action in case of a Level One (affecting a few people), Level Two (affecting a community) or Level Three emergency (affecting hundreds or thousands of people in a region).

The emergency may be a natural disaster, a man-made disaster or a public healthcare crisis such as a large-scale (pandemic) influenza (flu) outbreak.

Lions clubs, districts, and multiple districts have contacted local authorities and developed Lions ALERT plans to provide assistance in the event of a natural, man-made, or healthcare emergency. Samples of what some Lions Clubs' ALERT plans are appear below.

Created Volunteer Database - work with the federal and local emergency response departments to develop a database of trained, service club volunteers.

Collect and Deliver Supplies - partner with local companies for the collection and delivery of donated supplies to disaster victims.

Pandemic Influenza Preparedness - agree to assist during a pandemic influenza immunization effort.

Transporters of People, Pets - attend Red Cross training classes to learn how to transport citizens and pets to shelters in the event of an emergency. Lions also developed a Lions ALERT telephone tree.

List of Vulnerable Citizens - develop a list of vulnerable citizens, e.g., the elderly, physically or mentally disabled persons, who would require extra assistance during an emergency.

Bring Quality to Life - work with the Rescue Services to provide tents and blankets immediately after a disaster.

Food Service Assistance - agree to assist during emergency preparedness drills and to provide food service assistance after an emergency.

Each club will be contacted soon to see if the members are interested in participating in the Lions Alert Program. This program is strictly voluntary and can be tailored to suit your club.





ago, my favorite aunt suffered a stroke at age 40 and lost her eyesight," recalls John Monahan, the newly elected president of the Lord Baltimore Lions Club. "In those days, there weren't many options for people like her, and since a core mission of the Lions was to serve the visually impaired, I was inspired to join the club."

Then a resident of Warwick, N.Y., Monahan became a member at his local chapter. When he relocated to Delaware in late 2013, he joined the Lord Baltimore den, which currently has 58 members.

For 70 years, local Lions have carried out the initiatives of Lions Clubs International — the parent organization that has about 1.4 million members worldwide — from providing vision screenings and eyeglasses to supporting Special Olympics athletes and Leader Dogs for the Blind. The Bethany Beach-based

club, which serves Ocean View, Millville, Frankford, Clarksville and Dagsboro, also establishes additional programs based on the community's needs. "Each club has its own flavor," Monahan explains, "and we have a range of offerings for everyone from pre-kindergarteners to senior citizens."

As president, he hopes to focus on fresh initiatives for all ages: "Many people don't realize that a huge number of people lose their eyesight due to diabetes. There isn't enough awareness out there about diabetes, so that's something we'd like to work on — by acquainting our members with the disease and its warning signs, and partnering with a medical agency, we can help spread the word."

- Send a personal thank you note for joining
- Use testimonials from members who feel membership is valuable. If members feel we are trying to help them cope with challenges, they are more likely to renew.
- Send meeting Agenda out via e-mail several days before your meeting; ask for comments, suggestions, additions and ideas.
- Give incentives, such as a free gift for getting 2 or more new members.
- Have a new member lottery. New members and sponsors get a chance for a prize (free meal, half year dues, etc)
- Send weekly 'e-mail updates' to members with successes highlighted.
- Generate segmented and targeted recruiting. Tell how membership benefitted members.
- Send special certificates of recognition to new members and keep in close contact with them, especially within first year.
- Identify and recognize members with the most tenure.
- Establish a member mentoring plan. Assign new members to current members.
- Develop a written retention/membership plan.
