





There were over 30 men, women, addicts in recovery, children of addicts, parents of addicts, friends and family of those in addiction and those that have overdosed. There were testimonials of recovery and the struggle to stay sober. There were announcements of recent deaths because of overdoses.

The Chief of Ocean View PD Kenneth McLaughlin spoke and acknowledged our presents at this event. He told of what it was like only a few years ago when the opioid problem increased dramatically when addicts would be encountered or ask, no make that plead for him and his officers for help. It broke his heart, he said because then there was very few treatment facilities or medical help available. The hopeful news is that today there are more places addicts can get help in Delaware. The Chief of the Georgetown PD was also there for this event.

I was very proud of our Lions that attended this event and for the support of the Lord Baltimore Lions Club, form 22-D and especially the clubs in our area and their Zone and Region chairs. There is plenty of opportunity across the state of Delaware for the Lions, as the worlds largest service organization to get out in front of this crisis and help to make a difference. This idea came up in a conversation with the Indian River School District Curriculum Development Coordinator Dr. Luanne Hudson. What is a mentor?

"A mentor is a person or friend who guides a less experienced person by building trust and modeling positive behaviors. An effective mentor understands that his or her role is to be dependable, engaged, authentic, and tuned into the needs of the mentee."

"Today, most youth development organizations recognize the importance of a child having a caring responsible adult in their lives. For children who come from less than ideal circumstances, mentoring can be a critical ingredient towards positive youth outcomes."

"The word mentor comes from the character "Mentor" in Homer's epic tale, *The Odyssey*. Mentor was a trusted friend of Odysseus, the king of Ithaca. When Odysseus fought in the Trojan War, Mentor served as friend and counsel to Odysseus' son Telemachus. *Riverside Webster's II New College Dictionary* 1995 defines a mentor as "a wise and trusted teacher or counselor". The act of mentoring is a series of ongoing and little successes. You will be able to make a real impact through consistent and ongoing relationship building. 



Milford Lions Club examines sight screenings

In 1925, Helen Keller attended a Lions Club International Foundation convention in Cedar Point, Ohio. In her presentation about the American Foundation for the Blind, she closed with this remark: "I appeal to you, Lions - you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind, - will you not constitute yourselves Knight of the Blind in my erusade against darkness?

Now, with that goal in mind, the Lions clubs all over the world do just that. They collect unused eyeglasses and redistribute them. They develop "Sight Sereening" processes in which Harrington Lions with their kindergarten youth. young children are screened to measure the alignment of their eyes

The Milford Lions Club uses a device named

the eyes of children from 6 months through 8 years. In an average year 600 or more children are screened. All children need signed permission from their parents. If the screening indicates additional measures are needed, parents are given the results of the screening to take to an optometrist.

Milford Lions do the screening at various locations in and around Milford: Avenue Pre-School, Head Start, Morris School, and others, In addition to local screening, the Milford Lions assist Frederica-Spring Creek Lions screening at Lake Forest kindergarten students and the

In addition to the vision screening, the Milford Lions have several locations here in Milford where unused glasses can be dropped off. Club, visit https://milfordlions22d.com.

Senior Center, Delaware Eye Care, M & T Bank, Halpern Eye Care, Nemours Senior Care, Dr. Stump's office, Make Waves Salon, Rogers Funeral Home, and Village Optical.

The donated glasses are picked up by Lions members on the Delaware Lions Sight Team: The glasses are then sent to Sussex Correctional Institute where inmates determine the refraction and mark them. Following this, the glasses, about 300 per month, are taken to a location in Milton where Lions sort the glasses by refraction strength, lowest to highest. After this process, the glasses are boxed and taken to third world countries such as Nicaragua. Santo Domingo, and the Dominican Republic by Lions volunteers.
